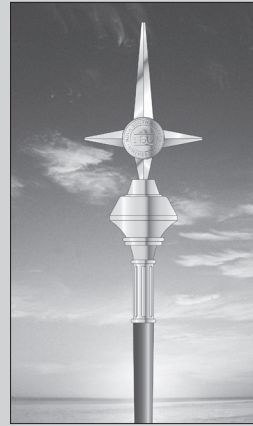

HISTORY OF THE MACE

During the Middle Ages, the mace was an effective weapon in battle and also was displayed as a symbol to command order during royal gatherings, religious ceremonies, and university classes. As newer and more powerful military arms were created, however, the mace progressed into a symbol of authority and today is frequently used to lead religious and academic processions.

The mace was originally a wooden staff carried by royal messengers as a symbol to preserve order and usher royal functions. The early wooden staff of such royal messengers or lead ushers of ceremonial processions was transformed in the 14th century into an elaborate sterling silver mace. Eventually, in the 15th century it evolved into a symbol of academic excellence and dignity.

NSU'S MACE

Before its merger in 1994 with Southeastern University of the Health Sciences, Nova University's mace bore a sterling silver "nova star" symbolizing the university's name and mission. Symbolically, Nova University's "nova star" burned brightly, providing educational enlightenment to the world. Today, a new sterling silver mace highlights the past, present, and future through the inclusion of the original "nova star" representing the university's past, surrounding the NSU seal. When not in official use, the mace is displayed in the rotunda of the William and Norma Horvitz Administration Building.

In Latin, "nova" means new or innovative. Nova Southeastern University was created to be an innovative educational institution—to take the best of traditional education from the past and mold it to fit the needs of students for today and tomorrow.

She was accepted into Nova Southeastern University's (NSU's) Dual Admission Program in osteopathic medicine and has been a member of the Farquhar Honors College throughout her undergraduate career.

Reinsel conducted research beginning in her sophomore year, alongside W. Matthew Collins, Ph.D., and Leanne Boucher, Ph.D., completing her undergraduate thesis, "Resilience and its Effects on Well-Being During the COVID-19 Pandemic," which works with the NIH through the All of Us Database. She presented her research at the NSU Undergraduate Student Symposium (2025), as well as the Crossroads Conference (2025). She is also a co-author on an upcoming publication titled "The Impact of Resilience and Cultural Factors on Psychology, Well-Being, and Adherence to Restrictions During the COVID-19 Pandemic."

In addition to her academic achievements, Reinsel was involved in a variety of service and leadership roles. She volunteered at the Visiting Nurses Association Hospice Care (2023-2025) and in the Emergency Room and Maternity Departments at Butler Memorial Hospital (2022-2024). She also worked as a pharmacy technician (2021-2023) and served as an Anatomy and Physiology II lab assistant (2023-2024). In 2024, she joined the Tutoring and Testing Center at NSU as a peer tutor, where she currently works to this day.

On campus, Reinsel served as president of Phi Sigma Sigma and was recognized with NSU's Outstanding Student Leader Award in 2024. She was inducted into the TriBeta Biological Honor Society in 2023 and maintained a strong academic standing throughout her time at NSU, making the dean's list several times.

After graduation, Reinsel plans to continue her studies at Nova Southeastern University's Dr. Kiran C. Patel College of Osteopathic Medicine. She owes all her success to her amazing and supportive network of family, friends, and mentors that have believed in her every step of the way, especially those who are no longer with us, but whose love still lights her way.

HALMOS COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES AND THE GUY HARVEY OCEANOGRAPHIC RESEARCH CENTER

Lauren Rose Nonnenmacher, of Freehold, New Jersey, will graduate with a degree in chemistry on the American Chemical Society (ACS) track, along with minors in marine biology and geographic information systems. She has made the dean's list throughout her undergraduate studies in these fields, while balancing her academic life with her love for nature, pottery, and film photography.

Nonnenmacher's interdisciplinary approach to her education has made her an active community member on both Nova Southeastern University's (NSU's) Fort Lauderdale/Davie and Oceanographic Campuses. Her involvement with Professor Amy Hiron, Ph.D., with the Charismatic Megafauna and Oceanography Laboratory (2022-2025) and Professor Dimitri Giarikos, Ph.D., with the Environmental Chemical Contaminants Organization (2022-2025) has given her a strong community, supporting her on her path into a life of research.

During her time at NSU, Nonnenmacher worked closely with Giarikos and Hiron on a series of research projects. She began her research journey employed as a laboratory research technician I (2022-2023), designing and constructing sediment trap platforms for deployment on the Florida Reef Tract. This role served as the steppingstone for her transition into independent research. Her next project, *Establishing Limit of Detection: Shimadzu AA-7800 GFAA Spectrophotometer* (2023-present), focused on optimizing the chemistry lab's atomic absorption spectrophotometer. During this time, she also worked as an administrative chemical researcher for the department (2024-2025).

Nonnenmacher has also led two environmental contaminant studies: "Global Assessment of Heavy Metals in Sediment from Areas of Geologic and Volcanic Activity" (2023-2024) and "Heavy Metal Distribution in Volcanic Hawaiian Sediment from 5 Million Years Ago to Present" (2023-2025). These studies were presented as posters at the American Chemical Society national conferences in 2024 (New Orleans) and 2025 (San Diego). The latter was also presented at the 2025 Undergraduate Student Symposium, where it was awarded first place in the Traditional Oral

Presentations category. Nonnenmacher has also been nominated by the Department of Chemistry and Physics for the SoFL-ACS Outstanding Graduating Seniors Award.

After graduating, Nonnenmacher plans to dedicate her career to continuing research in natural and physical sciences, with the goal of expanding the world's understanding of Earth's systems.

Kevin Rafferty is from Tinton Falls, New Jersey. He is majoring in marine biology and receiving minors in honors transdisciplinary studies, scientific diving, and geographic information science with a research citation. Rafferty is also a member of the Farquhar Honors College and made the dean's list his entire time at NSU.

Rafferty began to volunteer in the Fisheries and Avian Ecology laboratory with his current mentor and adviser, Professor David Kerstetter, Ph.D., in his sophomore year. Eventually the two developed the project that would become Rafferty's Honors Thesis, "Census of Non-U.S. Billfish and Swordfish Recreational Tournaments in the ICCAT Convention Area." This research was shared as a poster presentation at the Annual Florida Chapter meeting of the American Fisheries Society (2024); Rafferty received the Dennis Punches Student Travel Grant to attend the meeting. He also presented the poster at the Undergraduate Student Symposium (2025). Additionally, an oral presentation on the research was given at the Seventh International Billfish Symposium (2024), which Rafferty received the Pan Student Government Association Development Grant to help attend. Rafferty and Kerstetter plan on publishing this research in the near future.

On campus, Rafferty was involved in student leadership as an admissions ambassador his sophomore year. In this position he received the Dr. DeNapoli Legacy award (2023). He has also been a resident assistant (RA) in Mako Hall for the past two years and received the Mako Residential Assistant of the Year award in his senior year (2025).

Also in his senior year, Rafferty was selected as one of 10 Honors students to participate in the passport project. This involved students with limited travel experience taking a trip to learn about the culture and nature of Costa Rica.

Outside NSU, Rafferty expanded his scientific knowledge beyond marine systems through an internship position with the United States Geological Survey (USGS) Wetland and Aquatic Research Center (2023–2025). At the USGS, he has participated and assisted in a variety of different research projects, mainly pertaining to understanding the Greater Everglades Ecosystem. He presented the poster “Machine Learning Models for Water, Energy, and Greenhouse Gas Fluxes Measured from a Dwarf Cypress Wetland Within the Greater Everglades” at the Greater Everglades Ecosystem Restoration Conference (2025) with USGS.

Rafferty plans on pursuing a Master of Environmental Management degree at Duke University with concentrations in Coastal and Marine Systems and Environmental Economics and Policy. He ultimately wants to work in conservation management at the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) or an environmental protection agency.

Xi Zeta Chapter of Sigma Lambda Gamma National Sorority, Inc.

Jean Louis has also been an active member of numerous undergraduate student organizations, including Sociodrama: Stage

Jean Louis also conducted a senior independent research study in public health, including an in-depth literature review and community-needs assessment, Impact of Cultural Arts Programs on Adults Living with Individual Developmental Disorders, with the help of Joy Siegel, Ed.D. in collaboration with a local community partner.

Commencement Speakers

UNDERGRADUATE

MAY 5, 2025—MORNING CEREMONY

JEB BUSH, born February 11, 1953, in Midland, Texas, was the 43rd governor of the state of Florida (1999–2007). His leadership, dedication to public service, and commitment to education have left an indelible mark on our nation. As Florida's governor, Bush championed conservation in the Everglades, fiscal responsibility, and far-reaching state education reforms. And he is still making an impact, in Florida and beyond, as a philanthropist, a writer, and the founder and chair of ExcelinEd, an organization dedicated to enhancing educational opportunities for all children.

Born into a legacy of political influence, Bush carved out his own path. He attended Philips Academy in Andover, Massachusetts. During his senior year, he studied in Mexico, where he met Columba Garnica Gallo. The couple married in 1974 and later had three children. Also in 1974, Bush graduated *magna cum laude* from the University of Texas—Austin with a Bachelor of Arts in Latin American Studies and was hired by the Texas Commerce Bank. For a time, he worked at a branch of the bank in Venezuela.

In 1979, he left his job to work on his father's presidential campaign. George H. W. Bush ultimately became the vice-presidential running mate of Ronald Reagan, and the two were elected in 1980. In 1981, Bush moved to Florida and became a real estate developer, while also remaining active in politics. He served as the chairman of the Republican Party in Dade County (1984–1986) and as Florida's commerce secretary (1987–1988). In 1988, he again worked on his father's presidential campaign, successful this time.

In 1994, Bush ran for governor of Florida on a conservative platform and narrowly lost to the Democratic incumbent. He subsequently founded the Foundation for Florida's Future, which sought to improve the state's education system. Bush ran for governor again in 1998 and, this time, he easily won. In 2000, he worked on the presidential campaign of his brother, George W. Bush, who was elected to the presidency. Then, in 2002, Bush ran for, and was elected to, his second term as governor. From 1999 to 2007, during his terms as Florida's governor, he transformed the state into a model of fiscal responsibility, education reform, and economic growth. In addition, he controversially signed an executive order that ended affirmative action in the state.

After leaving office in 2007, Bush served on the boards of various companies and founded a consulting firm, while remaining active in politics. He cowrote (with Clint Bolick) *Immigration Wars: Forging an American Solution* in 2013, in which he argued against a path to citizenship for illegal immigrants and, instead, proposed granting them legal status.

In 2015, Bush announced that he was entering the U.S. presidential election race of 2016. Later that year, he published *Reply All*, a collection of email correspondence from his tenure as governor of Florida. Though he lost that race, Jeb Bush remains a respected and sought-after voice on local and global issues. He continues to make a difference as a businessman, author, and philanthropist today.

MAY 5, 2025—AFTERNOON CEREMONY

MITCHELL W. BERGER, ESQ., is a nationally recognized attorney, civic leader, and longtime supporter of Nova Southeastern University. As the founder and chairman emeritus of Berger Singerman, he has led Florida's business law firm for nearly four decades, representing clients, including Fortune 500 companies, in complex commercial litigation and shaping the legal landscape of the state.

Beyond his distinguished legal career, Berger has played a pivotal role in both state and national politics, serving as a senior adviser to Vice President Al Gore in 2000. He notably represented the Gore/Lieberman campaign before the Florida Supreme Court in the landmark *Bush v. Gore* case—a defining moment in United States electoral history—which earned him portrayals in HBO's *Recount* and *537 Votes*.

In addition to his high-profile political work, Berger has held key roles on numerous public commissions and task forces, reflecting his broad commitment to public service and policy leadership. He served as chairman of the board of Sallie Mae and contributed his expertise to the Governing Board of the South Florida Water Management District, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's Environmental Financial Advisory Board, the Florida Environmental Regulation Commission, and the United States Small Business Administration Advisory Board, and also received a presidential appointment for the Advisory Committee for Trade Policy and Negotiations. Through these roles, Berger has helped shape policies on education, environmental stewardship, economic development, and trade at both the state and national levels.

Berger's commitment to NSU runs deep. He has served on the university's board of trustees since 2006 and is a longtime member of the governing board for the Shepard Broad College of Law. He had also previously served on the board of the H. Wayne Huizenga College of Business and Entrepreneurship and, in 2010, was inducted into that college's Entrepreneur and Business Hall of Fame. Together with his wife, Sharon Kegerreis Berger, he helped launch the Sharon and Mitchell W. Berger Entrepreneur Law Clinic and the Berger Entrepreneur Bootcamp, an innovative, university-wide initiative that prepares students and community members to launch and lead successful start-ups.

A frequent speaker and published author on election law and constitutional issues, Berger has published four articles in the *Nova Law Review*. His lifelong commitment to public service, the law, and education reflects his belief in the power of civic engagement and innovation to drive meaningful change.

MAY 6, 2025—MORNING CEREMONY

CHAD A. PERLYN, M.D., PH.D., M.B.A., is the executive vice president and chief medical officer at Nova Southeastern University (NSU) and the executive medical director of NSU Health. As such, he directs the university's health care network, including eight colleges focused on education and research, as well as NSU Health, its patient-centered health care system. He is also the dean and a professor at NSU's Dr. Kiran C. Patel College of Allopathic Medicine. Perlyn joined NSU in December 2024, after serving as senior vice president at Nicklaus Children's Health System, where he led surgical services, community health, and corporate responsibility.

A distinguished leader in plastic and craniofacial surgery, Perlyn made significant contributions at Nicklaus Children's Health System, which he joined in 2009 as a pediatric plastic surgeon and later served in leadership roles, including president of Nicklaus Children's Pediatric Specialists, medical director of Surgical Services, and chairman of the Ambulatory Surgical Center. He expanded the physician group by 50 percent, led major affiliations, and developed multiple new practice sites and programs. Under his leadership, operational improvements were made, including streamlined patient access, scheduling, and revenue cycle processes. He also spearheaded the opening of the \$180-million Kenneth C. Griffin Surgical Tower, transforming pediatric surgical care in South Florida.

Perlyn is a global health leader, actively involved with the G4 Alliance on surgical care in low- and middle-income countries and collaborating with Partners in Health in Haiti and Kausay Wasi in Peru to improve accessible, affordable health care worldwide. As a board-certified pediatric plastic surgeon, he cares for children with congenital differences and contributes to the field through publications, lectures, and media commentary.

Perlyn earned his M.D. from the University of Miami, completed surgical training at Washington University/Barnes-Jewish Hospital, and obtained a doctorate in craniofacial molecular biology from the University of Oxford. He also holds an M.B.A. in health care education from the University of Miami's Herbert Business School and a degree in English literature from Northwestern University. A Miami native, Perlyn enjoys ocean activities, marathon running, photography, and travel.

ACADEMIC ATTIRE

Ceremonial garments worn at academic functions take their meaning from the original centers of learning of the western world in the church of the Middle Ages. Caps, hoods, and gowns of the early students and monks have been held through the centuries to be traditionally symbolic of the scholarly devotion so basic to education and to the deliberate and orderly evolution of knowledge.

The introduction of classical studies, the gradual rise of the great universities across Europe, and the ever-increasing awareness of the decisive role of education in the entire development of civilization influenced leaders among academicians in their desire for a singular identity. In the attempt to create this differentiation, educators fell upon the medieval system of classic heraldry, whereby the coat of arms, assorted ornamental trappings, and patterns of colorful design had been adopted to denote the distinctive character of designated chivalric orders. The function of a pedagogical heraldry became, then, simply identification. As such, measures were taken to signify through distinctive markings on the academicians' attire the institution that had granted the degree, the field of learning in which the degree had been earned, and the level of the degree, e.g., bachelor's, master's, or doctorate.

Of the three pieces of academic attire—the cap, the gown, and the hood—it is the hood that offers the most abundant and most readily discernible information about its owner. The inner lining of the hood identifies the institution at which the individual earned the degree. Some schools have adopted two-color patterns and introduced chevrons and bars in various designs to set themselves apart from other institutions. The velvet trim bordering the hood indicates the major field of learning, or faculty, in which the degree has been earned. The list at the conclusion of this section will explain this relationship. A final feature of the hood concerns its length and width and distinguishes further between holders of bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degrees. The length of the hood for the bachelor's degree is three feet, closed at the bottom, and with a velvet border of two inches. At Nova Southeastern University, however, individuals receiving a bachelor's degree do not wear a hood. A master's degree holder has a hood three and one-half feet in length with a three-inch wide border, and the hood is slit at the bottom. Those individuals with a doctoral degree wear a hood four feet in length, open at the bottom with a five-inch border.

The cut of the gown aids in differentiating between the three levels of degrees. The

bachelor's gown is relatively simple and falls in straight lines from an elaborate yoke. It may be recognized most readily by the long, pointed sleeves. The master's gown is somewhat fuller and bears no adornment. The sleeves are oblong in shape and open at the wrist, with the rear part of the oblong square cut while the front edge has a cutaway arc. The doctor's gown is more elaborate, with velvet panels down the front and around the neck of the garment. The sleeves are bell-shaped at the end and have three bars of the same material as the front panels at the upper portion of the arm. It is cut rather fully and may be ornamental in color.

The mortarboard or Oxford-type cap has been adopted throughout most universities in the United States, although tams have become increasingly fashionable to denote holders of the doctoral degree. Colored tassels are usually worn by holders of the bachelor's and master's degrees. These denote the field of learning.

The color, indeed, the flamboyance, of academic dress undoubtedly adds to the sense of occasion at academic ceremonies. But as its historical roots show, it has a much deeper significance. It is an outward sign of the universality of universities, and of their responsibility for certain timeless values essential to the freedom

of inquiry: tolerance of alternative views and courage in maintaining one's own tirelessness in the pursuit of truth and the free exchange of knowledge. Its wearing marks also the responsibility of the new graduate to maintain and uphold these ideals. These fundamentals of academic freedom have not been threatened in this country for more than 200 years, but the importance attached to the donning of traditional academic dress was underlined in recent years by scholars from Central and Eastern Europe; during the Cold War, their use of academic robes became a symbol of their refusal to be dominated completely by political forces and the state, and symbolized their persistent links to the worldwide community of scholars. Thus, the wearing of academic dress should be seen not simply as a sign of achievement, but as a symbol of the responsibility that falls on all members of universities.

HONORS

Students wear cords, pins, sashes, and medallions that reflect institutional and national academic honors as well as campus leadership, service, and engagement.

COLOR OF HOODS

The colors found on the hoods worn in the academic procession represent the candidate's discipline of study.
